Major Project – New Tower

At last we can report the completion of our new monopole tower (well, almost anyway). I say almost as there are still some cosmetic tasks to complete, such as fitting a cover on the cable tray, etc.

The antennas were all mounted in the latter part of September with the attendant cables being installed in the early part of October. The various VHF and UHF repeaters were then connected to the new antennas in the latter part of October.

All of the repeaters (6m, 2m, 70cm and 23cm) are now operational via their new antennas on the tower. 23cm was initially a worry, with little to no coverage. What could be wrong? Turns out the repeater decided that the time was right for a failure. The fault was rectified and now all is well.

The new antennas are:-

6m – ZCG Scalar B40 vertical dipole.

2m – RFI COL53 collinear vertical.

70cm – RFI BA80-67 multiple vertical dipole.

23cm – European Antennas VAO4-1270/0037.

There are three of each of the above antennas mounted on the tower. The uppermost in each case is the repeater receiving antenna. The second highest is the relevant transmit antenna while the lowest of each is a reserve.

We have some signal/performance reports from members, not all in complete agreement. It would be of significant interest to receive member signal reports now all repeaters are operational on the new tower. Of particular interest would be reports from members further afield or from known hitherto poor reception areas. Just send your report to the editor at editor@arnsw.org.au.

Do You Know Your Directors?

This issue we continue with our profile of our Directors. Eric – VK2VE is a Director in the very important role of Secretary. Here is what Eric has to say.

I originally obtained my Amateur Radio licence in my last year of school finally receiving my first call, VK2ZUR, in early 1971. I progressed to the combined call, VK2KUR, in 1982 and then got my full call VK2VE, in the late 90's. I recently sat for and got a US extra licence, AC3EY, just for fun.

I grew up in the eastern suburbs of Sydney, in Bondi, where my youth was spent in Scouting and the beaches and playing electronics and doing repairs for extra pocket money.

What Is Amateur Radio? - Revisited

In the first edition of *All Access* the question was asked "What Does Amateur Radio Mean to You?". The answer was not expected to be simple and your responses were eagerly awaited. Unfortunately there were none. Subsequently I read a feature article in the RSGB Journal, Radcom, in the October 2019 edition. The article was titled "Refreshing the RSGB Organisation". In it they asked the very same question. I quote the opening paragraphs.

"Perhaps you are a keen contester or maybe you are happy with a casual chat on air? If you have a shelf full of books you clearly like learning new things. Maybe you enjoy teaching others, too. Perhaps you like the challenge of experimenting in ways that haven't been tried before? Or could it be you are one of the group who watch our spectrum and the pressures on it from others?

These four examples can be generalised to Operating, Learning, Innovation and Representation. Almost everything we do as amateurs fits into one or more of these categories."

The article goes on from there to discuss at length these matters and the RSGB 2022 Strategy. I largely agree with the statements made but feel they have omitted an important aspect, being service to community. Amateur operators assist in many community based activities, most notably in such times as we are experiencing now with widespread bush fires.

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I believe it is a question we need to understand. When asked by acquaintances about my interests I quote Amateur Radio. I am often met with "oh, does that still exist?" or some other statement of ignorance of what we do. Then, when asked, "what do you do, then?" I feel compelled to provide a complete answer that shows us in a good light. But, as I said in the beginning, it is a question with a complex answer. I, for one, would very much like to see our pastime continue into the future for my children and grandchildren to enjoy. This will only be the case if we are recognised as being a valuable part of the community in which we live.
